Features Need a Place to Meet? Variety

The Marion County Public Library offers two meeting rooms with wifi access, closed-circuit tvs. and DVD players. The Mannington and Fairview branches also have meeting rooms available for general use. And the best part is, they're free!

You can reserve a room by visiting our website at www.mcpls.org. Once there, click on the How Do I? icon in the task bar to the far right of the page. You will be directed to a help page. The first topic under Ask a Question is Book a Meeting Room. Click on mcpls.evanced.info/spaces; then just follow the directions to apply for space at any of our locations. You will be contacted when your reservation is confirmed, usually within 12-24 hours. That's it.

The library offers so much more than books. Check out our online services to download music, ebooks, audiobooks, and movies. With Zinio, you can have a variety of great magazines at your fingertips. We also offer a selection of free programming for all ages, and our new exhibit room features traveling exhibits from all over the country. 
Fiction Addiction will meet December 8, at 4:30 to discuss *Graceling* by Kristin Cashore.
